# Rev. Daniel Bell examines ethics in the developing world

The Rev. Daniel M. Bell, Jr., Ph.D., associate professor of Theological Ethics at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, S.C., is considered an expert in theology and economics, especially in the context of the developing

As this year's Ethics Center lecturer at King's College, Dr. Bell will present two talks at King's on Tuesday, March 14.

At 11 a.m. he will discuss, "Capitalist Theology and Christian Economics." In his lecture at 3:30 p.m., Dr. Bell focuses on "The Terror of Savage Capital and the Faith of the Crucified: Latin American Liberationists on the Global Economic Order." Both addresses are free and open to the public in the Burke Auditorium.

The lectures are sponsored by King's College Center for Ethics and Public Life.

Dr. Bell's articles have been published in various journals including *Modern* Theology, Journal for Peace and Justice Studies, and Pro Ecclesia. He has presented papers before distinguished organizations such as the Latin American Studies Association International Congress, the American Academy of

Religion, and the Irish School of Ecumenics.

His book, "Liberation Theology After the End of History", is based on his dissertation, "The Refusal to Cease Suffer-



ing: the Crucified People and the Liberation of Desire."

Daniel M. Bell, Jr. is an ordained elder in The United Methodist Church. A graduate of Stetson University in Florida, he earned the Master of Divinity degree from Duke Divinity School and the Doctor of Philosophy degree in theology and ethics from Duke University where he taught courses at the divinity school.

Before joining the Southern Seminary faculty in the Fall of 2000, Dr. Bell was Assistant Professor and Chair of the Department of Philosophy and Religion at Monmouth College in Illinois. Prior to that position, he taught at Truman State University in Kirksville, Mo., and at Meredith College in Raleigh, N.C.
