Due to the generosity of the King's College Community, King's Theatre Department was able to raise \$400 for the Matthew Shepard Foundation during the recent performance of *The Laramie Project* from February 16-19.

Sheileen Corbett, assistant professor of theatre, says, "I am pleased that as a college community we were able to actively participate in developing solutions to problems that are rooted in ignorance and hatred by donating to the Matthew Shepard Foundation."

The Matthew Shepard Foundation was founded by Dennis and Judy Shepard in memory of their son Matthew and is carrying out Matthew's legacy by developing educational materials and programs that raise awareness of discrimination and the value of diversity.

King's 'spares' no effort

For the third straight year, King's College has raised more money than any other area college to support the Big Brothers program. The King's community showed its support for the local Big Brothers and Big Sisters program at this year's Bowlathon, providing more than 125 bowlers, forming 33 teams, and raising \$2,811, about \$700 more than last year, for "Bowl For Kids' Sake" at Stanton Lanes in Wilkes-Barre.

Italian immigrants' struggles recounted in Burke, April 19

King's will host a presentation by Mary Anconetani based on her novel *Fiery Fields: How Italian Immigrants Struggled to Achieve the American Dream*, in the Burke Auditorium on Tuesday, April 19, at 7 p.m. with a reception to follow.

The *Fiery Fields* novel is based upon some of the hardships that Italians faced in America from 1909 to 1917, and the slides and lecture expands upon their experiences.

The novel and presentation is based on years of research, which was sparked by a chance comment by Anconetani's father, who was among more than 24,000 striking workers during the historic 1913 Paterson Silk Strike.

Anconetani's talk is made possible through the co-sponsorship of the King's College Ethnic Communities and Associations Outreach program and UNICO in cooperation with Luzerne County Community College Workforce and Community Development Division, and The Coccia Institute for the Italian Experience in America at Montclair State University, N.J.
