## McKewon explores 'The Life of St. Patrick'

In anticipation of St. Patrick's Day, King's College Ethnic Community and Association's Outreach Program will present the story of the life of St. Patrick in the Burke Auditorium on Monday, March 14, at 7 p.m.



John C. McKeown, director of King's Irish Teachers Program and Cultural Chairman of the local Irish Societies, will cover St. Patrick's success in Ireland's conversion to Christianity from paganism, Celtic culture and traditions in Ireland and in Europe.

The lecture is free and open to the public.

McKeown recently completed a three-part lecture series on Celtic Christianity and Spirituality as part of the ethnic culture and history courses made possible through the sponsorship of the Ethnic Community Outreach of Ethnic Communities and Associations Initiative (ECAI) at King's. ECAI was launched in mid-2002 to explore, recognize and celebrate the role of ethnic communities and their voluntary organizations in northeastern Pa.

## Dependent Tuition Remission

### Information for preparing your 2004 taxes

Employees who have a dependent child attending King's College under the Tuition Remission program need to be aware that section 404.2 of the policy states:

"A dependent son/daughter applicant is not eligible for tuition remission if the dependent son/ daughter applicant.. is not listed as a dependent son/ daughter as defined by the Internal Revenue Service tax reporting guidelines."

This means you must claim your son/daughter as a dependent on your income tax form. If you have any questions, contact Beth Ann Hill in the Human Resources Department at ext. 5922.
