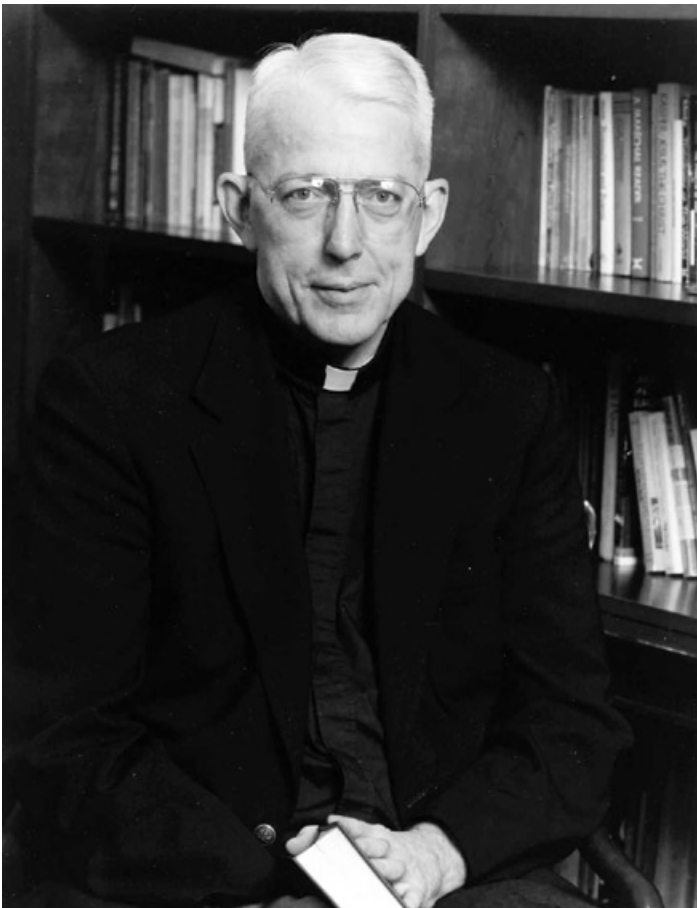

## King's announces Commencement weekend festivities



### Rev. Edward Malloy, C.S.C., to address over 430 graduates at commencement

President Emeritus of the University of Notre Dame, Rev. Edward A. Malloy, C.S.C., will deliver the commencement address to the graduating class of King's College on Sunday, May 21.

From 1987 to 2005, Father Malloy served as the 16th president of the University of Notre Dame. He was elected by the Board of Trustees in 1986, having served five years as vice president and associate provost. Father Malloy is a full professor in the Department of Theology and has been a member of the faculty since 1974. A rarity among university presidents, he continues to teach, conducting a seminar for first-year undergraduates each semester, and he makes his home in a student residence hall on campus.

A native of Washington, D.C., Father Malloy is the author of more than 50 articles and book chapters, the editor or co-editor of two books, and has published six books. His last book, entitled *Monk's Notre Dame* was published in September 2005 by University Press. An ethicist by training, he is a member of the Catholic Theological Society of America and the Society of Christian Ethics.

Father Malloy earned his doctorate in Christian ethics from Vanderbilt University in 1975, and Vanderbilt honored him in 1998 with the establishment of a chair in Catholic Studies in his name. He has also been awarded numerous honorary degrees.

## King's to confer three honorary degrees at ceremony

At the Commencement Ceremony, Rev. Thomas J. O'Hara, C.S.C., president of King's College, will confer honorary degrees on Bishop of Dinajpur Moses Costa, C.S.C.; local journalist and columnist Dick Cosgrove; and community leader Sr. Miriam Francis Stadulis, RSM.

Bishop Costa, a finally Professed Religious in the Congregation of Holy Cross, was ordained to the Roman Catholic Priesthood on February 5, 1981. Following Episcopal Ordination in 1996, Bishop Costa became the sixth Bishop of the Dinajpur Catholic Diocese in Bangladesh.

Dick Cosgrove is a longtime resident of the Wyoming Valley. His introduction to journalism began with the *Times Leader* in 1943. He joined the staff of the *Sunday Dispatch* in Pittston for publication of its first edition, and remained with the publication through the summer of 2000 when he affiliated with *The Citizens' Voice* as a writer and columnist.

Sr. Miriam Francis Stadulis is a highly regarded community leader. She founded the John B. McGlynn Center as an outreach to families and children in low-income housing. Sr. Stadulis has served as an administrator, counselor, and professor. Sr. Stadulis entered the Sisters of Mercy in September 1954.

# King's announces \$30 million Capital Campaign goal at annual President's Dinner



On May 6, more than 275 guests celebrated with King's College at the annual President's Dinner. John O'Brien, Chairman of the Legacy of Excellence Campaign, announced a \$30 million Capital Campaign goal, of which \$19 million has already been raised. King's has been in the quiet phase of the Capital Campaign since July of 2003. The Campaign is scheduled to continue through 2008.

"This Campaign demonstrates King's commitment to its students, faculty and staff, and to the renaissance of downtown Wilkes-Barre," stated Rev. Thomas J. O'Hara, C.S.C., President, King's College. "King's is ever mindful of how fortunate we are to have many loyal and generous friends and alumni, and the President's Dinner is one way the College thanks our individual and corporate donors who have given to ongoing initiatives and new projects."

Campaign funds are being raised for College improvements in downtown Wilkes-Barre north of Public Square, scholarship assistance, academic growth and faculty development, endowment for the Shoal Center for Community Engagement and Learning, as well as additional campus needs.

## People at King's

**Dr. Gregory Bassham**, Professor of Philosophy, published his article, "Teaching Ought Imperatives," in a recent issue (Vol. 24, No. 2) of *Informal Logic*. Gregory Bassham and **Marc Marchese**, Associate Professor of Human Resources Management, published their article "Don't Play on Tilt! Avoiding Seven Costly Critical Thinking Errors in Poker" in Eric Bronson (ed.), *Poker and Philosophy* (Open Court, 2006). Dr. Bassham also ran the 2006 Boston Marathon, finishing in 3:22:24. After the race, he challenged several top finishers to compete in a "Philosopher's Triathlon" (run 15 miles, bike 70 miles, recite Kant's transcendental deduction in the original German), but had no takers.
