'Hunger for Justice Week'

To call attention to the plight of the homeless, the hungry, the afflicted, and those seeking social justice in the world, King's again presents a series of annual on-campus programs in "Hunger for Justice Week," a nationwide project across college campuses. The King's community is invited to participate in the following events:

The observance begins at 8 a.m. on Monday, Nov. 15 with a 60-Hour **Homeless Experience in the College park**. Students, faculty, and staff will experience firsthand the challenges of survival that the homeless face each day. They will live outdoors in College park with no possessions, no food, and only the shelter of a cardboard box.

As the 60-hour watch continues, King's will hold a **candlelight vigil** on Tuesday, Nov. 16 at the homeless camp in the College park at 9 p.m. to remember all those who have died homeless.

Harvesting Justice: Focus on Farming and Farm Workers brings together a panel representing farm, migrant and food workers, small-farm owners, legal and social service spokespersons. Panelists will address the struggles faced by the workers and farmers, the efforts to improve conditions through worker and farmer organizing, legislative and policy efforts, and public education. Sponsored by The Public Policy and Research Institute on Tuesday, Nov. 16, from 3:30-5 p.m. in the Burke Auditorium of the McGowan School of Business.

Caring Cases represents the efforts of the King's community to fight hunger by purchasing cases of food that will be on display in the Sheehy-Farmer Campus Center on Friday, Nov. 19, before they are donated to REACH, an emergency food program.
