Nominations for Rosenn Award

Nominations are currently being accepted for the annual Max and Tillie Rosenn Award for Faculty Excellence. The award, established in 1998 by the Hon. Max Rosenn, Senior Circuit Judge of the Third District Federal Court, recognizes an outstanding member of the teaching faculty of King's College at Commencement exercises each year.

Members of the King's College community are invited to participate in the nomination process by submitting a brief statement identifying the faculty member and stating the case for their recognition. A selection committee chaired by last year's recipient, Dr. Paul Zbiek, will choose the finalists to be submitted to Rev. Donald J. Grimes, C.S.C., vice president for academic affairs and dean of the faculty.

This year's award will be given to a tenured member in the Natural Science Division. Brandon J. Case Memorial "Spin For Life"

Sickler's Bike and Sport Shop is sponsoring the 3rd Annual Spin for Life to benefit the King's College Brandon Case Memorial Fund and The Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. Spin for Life will be held on Feb. 28, 2004, at Sickler's shop in Exeter from 7 a.m.- 7 p.m.

The event is seeking anyone from the King's College community interested in contributing to this memorial: sponsors, teams, or support riders to join Susan and Mark Farrell of Sickler's Bike and Sport Shop and Donna and Paul Zbiek on Feb. 28. Last year, "Spin for Life," raised \$7,600, with nearly 500 people spinning or lending support.

Teams are made up of five people, including a captain, and each team will ride simultaneously during a reserved time slot. Individual riders are also welcome and can sign up for any time slot; each rider is asked to raise \$20 and ride for one hour. Sickler's Bike and Sport Shop has a good number of spin bikes, but morning riding hours are the first to be selected.

Brandon Case, stepson of Dr. Paul Zbiek, was a freshman at King's when he was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Disease in April 1997. In November 1998, after a brief remission, it was discovered that he contracted secondary leukemia. Brandon battled the disease with strength and maintained his sense of humor, becoming an inspiration to all he encountered; but, despite his courage, Brandon passed away two months after his 21st birthday on September 27, 1999. Brandon's battle against blood-related cancers continues through the efforts of The Leukemia and Lymphoma Society.

Sickler's Bike and Sport Shop will be providing all of the expenses for "Spin for Life," making it possible for all donations to go directly into the memorial fund. As a tribute to his courage and his love for life, Brandon's family established the Brandon J. Case Memorial Fund at King's College; the endowment is directed to benefit students and each year the Brandon J. Case Memorial Award is presented to a graduating senior.

The donation for major sponsors is \$150, and these sponsors will have their name included on the T-shirt. Major sponsors can include group contributions from any organization, department, or group from King's College. Refreshments, prizes and entertainment will be featured throughout the event. Individual donations are welcome; checks can be made out to The Brandon J. Case Memorial Fund.
